[DIGGING DEEPER]

"It is after you have realized that there is a real Moral Law, and a Power behind the law, and that you have broken that law and put yourself wrong with that Power -- it is after all this, and not a moment sooner, that Christianity begins to talk." - CS Lewis

The above quote comes from the book *Mere Christianity*. One of the most common arguments against the existence of God, and therefore heaven as well, is the 'amount of evil in the world.'

However, Lewis makes the point: how can we identify what is wrong/evil if we have no concept of what is right/good!?! And more importantly, where does that sense come from in the first place?

Read the following passages and write out a reflection or two about how they bring clarity to human's relationship with God and our 'goodness' (or lack thereof).

James 4:12-17

Ecclesiastes 12:13-14

Matthew 22:37-40

Often it seems like when we think or talk about the desire or need to be *good people*, there's typically a reason about being rewarded in this life or the next. How does the view of the afterlife tend to affect people? And what do you think most people trust in for their eternal security?
